- Aileen Gardner gave an update on **Thanksgiving Meals/Winter Wishes**. Families can request assistance for the holidays using an online form.
  - o The Thanksgiving Meal Assistance Form is posted on the Facebook group and PTO website. The deadline to request assistance for Thanksgiving is Thursday, 11/19. Meals will be delivered on Sunday, 11/22. The PTO and Lettered Streets Covenant Church ("LCCC") can serve around 25-30 families with meal baskets LCCC provides the fixings and the PTO community provides the Turkeys through donations.
  - o For Winter Wishes, schools in the Bellingham School District are moving away from gift buying and empowering families by providing gift cards. Eventually the Winter Wishes program will all go through the Family Resource Center (the "FRC").

### Mylo Update

- The first week back at school with the Kindergarteners went very well. First graders come back Thursday, 11/12 and everyone anticipate it will go well. All of the Parkview support staff is at school to help with the transition.
- New School Construction Update: First walls will start to go up Thursday or Friday, and we will start to see shape the and geography of the school start to take shape. Building will be completely framed in approximately 25-30 workdays.
- There was a question about what kind of space the PTO will have at the new school. The PTO will still have our outdoor shed, and there is also a meeting/flexible space that could

also be used for the PTO. There may also be a dedicated office for the PTO. The use of the space is dependent on the number of students enrolled to attend next year. Mylo also discussed the PTO coordinating an art installation, purchasing a show piece salmon tank, etc. to fill the school since we will lose our current art when the school is demolished.

## Guest Speaker: Emily Machin-Mayes from Whatcom Dispute Resolution Center

Emily Machin-Mayes typically works with 4-12<sup>th</sup> grade students in the classroom. Ms. Machin-Mayes led a discussion on sibling conflict. The group discussed causes of conflict and traits that help with conflict resolution. The group also discussed pathways to help children deal with conflict: Problem Solve and Coach, Choices Reminders, Ask for their help/redirect. Adults should Listen, share your part, and then brainstorm with the child to find solutions.
